



Protest Movements in European Integration History (1950-2000)

Online Workshop of the Jean Monnet Chair EU-CONV (Sciences Po Rennes)

22-23 May 2025

The history of protest movements and the history of European integration have long been written separately from each other and largely disconnected. Political science studied extensively the Europeanisation of social movements in reaction to European policies since the 1990s. However, the diversity of social mobilisations related to the various EC/EU policies and to the accelerated process of long-term European convergence have only been examined in short-term and sectoral studies. This research project will reconsider the role of protest movements in the history of European integration from the 1950s to the 1990s. It will thereby make a contribution to the social history of the European project.

As a preparatory stage for an international conference scheduled for 2026, this workshop brings together specialists in protest movements and European integration from different disciplines to discuss four main types of movement:

- 1) transnational reactions to EC/EU policies;
- 2) national reactions to EC/EU policies;
- 3) transnational movements calling for more European integration or policies;
- 4) national movements protesting against state policies resulting directly from European integration processes (opening up of markets, enlargement, external constraints, convergence criteria).

The subject will be delimited by a repertoire of actions corresponding to movements involving different kinds of protest (demonstration, occupation, petition, contestation, etc.). Actions involving simple lobbying will not be considered.

- brief presentations (10') of research perspectives followed by discussions
- general discussions on the key themes of the topic
